



3D printing with the 5th Graders

Last quarter a fifth grade special was with Mrs. Brezovec. One of the things that she and the eighth grade peer mentors did with them was 3D printing in Tinkercad. They created an account, then learned how to create a 3D object. Once a work plane was opened, they had to convert the grid into inches. Next, they were given an option of creating a box or a key chain. If they chose a box, they learned how to size it, put a hole in it, and some put text on it. A key chain taught, shape choosing, text, and how to create a hole for the chain to go in. Once finished, students shared their creation via a link with Mrs. Brezovec. If they had more time they could create another item. The items were printed on the 3D printer. To print, you need the application called Flash Print. This is how it goes. You open the object in Tinkercad and export it as

an .stl. Then in Flash Print, you click load and select your .stl out of downloads. Then, on the side, select move, then click center. After that, click supports if needed. After that, you can click print. Make sure it is connected to your printer via wifi or USB. Also, before you print, make sure the surface that the object is being printed on is covered with blue painter's tape. The building time is dependent on how big the design was created. After it is finished, remove the tray and GENTLY take the creation off with a spatula. After that, if needed, change the painter's tape that is on the tray. The fifth graders' objects, as you may hear over the announcements, are being printed, and they get called down to collect them and have their pictures taken. The printing of a 3D object is a lot of fun once you get a hang of it, so I hope you get to give it a try.



Posters in Language Arts




Current PE

Garage Band in Music

In Mrs. Fortin's 6th grade music classes the students have just started using Garage Band on the computers. They will be creating songs with different instrument patterns. On the first and second day the classes were working on setting up their computer and getting everything ready. After that they began picking out what type sounds they wanted. Two classes in the 6th grade are working on Garage Band, Mrs. Jones class and Mrs. Brophy's class. When the Garage Band unit ends everyone will unplug their headphones from the computers and one at a time they will play their projects for the whole class. Mrs. Fortin will grade everyone's project. When students think their project is done, they can start working on a new one. In Garage Band everyone picks out what genre of music they want and pick sounds that fit into that genre. To create a Garage Band song you look for what instrument you want and then pick a sound for that instrument and drag it into an area. It will make a bar; you can stretch out the bar to make it as long as you want. The length of the bar will control how long the sound will last. Every song should have a steady beat that continues throughout the whole song, and these steady beats can be different with every song. The songs can be anywhere from two minutes to four minutes. During Garage Band students are in the atrium lab next to the library. Students are usually excited to go work on Garage Band and see what kinds of music they will find. When you drag sounds onto the measures they create blue bars, although some of the bars can be green. When you're working on Garage Band you can hear some people's songs, if they're playing too loudly, and the sound of mouses clicking. You can control the sound of the song by pressing a button and then clicking the place you want the volume to be, higher or lower. This is my perspective of what you do with Garage Band.

Mr. Cipolla's Before School Workout

Everyday before school one of a gym teachers, Mr. Cipolla, runs a before school workout for anyone that is willing to put in the work to get stronger. He has been doing this since the beginning of October and is hoping he can continue doing this until the end of the year. He does the workouts in the weight area next to the EHP room in the 7th grade wing. There are days where he can't use the weights because they are not available or he doesn't have the right equipment for what he wants to do. So he sometimes does the workout to the side of the gym while other kids are doing open gym. Since some kids like the eighth graders are usually stronger than 6th graders Mr. Cipolla has them use the heavier weights than the 6th graders would use. For example, if the kids were doing the neck press, the 8th graders would do 70 lb bench presses while the 6th graders would do a 45 lbs bench

press. Most of the workouts are done with the machines, but Mr. Cipolla also does a lot of simple workouts like push-ups and sit-ups. Mr. Cipolla also does workouts at PLUS block for the kids that don't get to school on time. He does the same thing he does in the morning but at PLUS block, and 20 minutes longer. In order for kids to workout at PLUS block, though, they have to have all their work done. That includes: AR, any work has been done in class, homework, and any tests or quizzes that you may have missed or not finished. Mr. Cipolla is giving students the opportunity to get stronger for whatever they do outside of school, whether it's gymnastics or baseball or any kind of sport. Students can take advantage of this opportunity to get themselves better and possibly improve the South Meadow School athletics, as well.




Christmas is Almost Here!
